### PENTECOST

### PENTECOST

Pentecost completes the story of the birth, crucifixion, resurrection and ascension of Jesus. It is the moment when Jesus provides his followers and church with the Holy Spirit - the spiritual power they need to undertake His work.

Acts chapter 2 verses 1 to 4 describes that moment— "When the day of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place. <sup>2</sup> Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where they were sitting. <sup>3</sup> They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. <sup>4</sup> All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them."

There was a time when the day of Pentecost (or Whitson) was celebrated as part of the national calendar of holidays. Today this has been replaced by the 'Spring Holiday' which comes on the last Monday in May each year. Both the existence and significance of Pentecost has been lost to the majority of people. Our spiritual life and that of our church still depends on the power of the Holy Spirit of that first Pentecost. Our prayer this month is that we will be refreshed and renewed in the power of the Holy Spirit as individuals and the church as we serve God in Mottingham.



### LOCAL COUNCIL ELECTIONS

Once again, on the 3<sup>rd</sup> May everyone who is over 18 throughout the London

Boroughs is given the opportunity to vote in the local elections. This was not always the case.

### THE RIGHT TO VOTE

There has been a lot in the news about the significance of 2018 as the centenary of women's rights to vote and the battles and bravery of women over many years to win that right. But the history of voting rights shows that it was not only women who had no right to vote before 1918, but also 70% of men. Before 1918 and after 1867 only men over 21 who personally paid rates whether as house owners or tenants were eligible to vote. In 1918 all men over 21 in this country were given the right to vote and included those previously excluded such men who were non-householders — those living with their parents, or in the homes of their employers (such as servants), or in barracks (soldiers, etc), or who were homeless.

For women, however, 1918 was only a turning point. The majority of women were still unable to vote. Only women who were over the age of 30, and who were either registered property occupiers of land or buildings with a rateable value greater than £5 (or married to registered property occupiers) were now able to vote. It was not until 1928 that discrimination against women's eligibility to vote was finally rectified so that women over 21, like their male counterparts, were able to vote. It was not until 1969 that the voting age was dropped to 18.

### .....TO COMFORT

Paul shares his experience in Asia, when writing to the Corinthians: 'We

were under great pressure, far beyond our ability to endure, so that we despaired of life itself. Indeed, we felt we had received the sentence of death' (2 Corinthians 1:verses 8&9). God proved able to comfort him in all his hardships.

### GOD IS A GOD OF ALL COMFORT:

'Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of compassion and the God of all comfort' (2 Corinthians 1 verse 3) Comfort, which is inherent to God's character, means 'getting alongside to help'. It also describes the work of the Holy Spirit as 'comforter' (John 14:16). Whatever our circumstances, God comes alongside with His presence, provision, protection, guidance and peace.

#### GOD IS ABLE TO COMFORT US:

'For just as we share abundantly in the sufferings of Christ, so also our comfort abounds through Christ.' (2 Corinthians 1 verse 5) God does not promise to keep us from suffering, but Jesus shares this experience with us. We have the assurance that God is present in our difficulties, setbacks and disappointments. God uses troubles to teach us trust and dependence, as well as building our character.

### **GOD ENABLES US TO COMFORT OTHERS:**

"...He comforts us in all our troubles, so that we can comfort those in any trouble with the comfort we ourselves receive from God.' (2 Corinthians 1 verse 4). It's easy to offer cheap comfort: 'I know what you are going through!' Yet sharing God's comfort means telling our story and pointing them back to Him. We cannot offer comfort to people at a distance, but need to be prepared to get alongside others in their troubles, whatever the cost to ourselves.
