One thing is for sure we are a different group of people now worshipping in this place, some have died, we think particularly of Doreen and Jackie, some have moved on to pastures new, but many are new who have come to join us.

For me, some of the best times have been, when we've worked together as a team, working parties clearing that alley way, decorating the back room and hosting the Christian Aid Big Breakfast. As a group of people you're wonderful at joining in, supporting each other and those in the churches around you, we've had some wonderful Lent courses, the first session often spent looking for the remote control for Doreen's DVD player. Church although not always packed out to the doors, has been a real time of coming together for us all - crafts that haven't worked and the spiders on elastic that made us all laugh, times when we can share and learn from each other. We have a great group of ladies who meet once a month, the spread of food they produce between them for a yearly celebration is truly amazing, and the lunch club is full of characters that all have a story to share, and on the whole all look out and care for each other. Wow what a long way we've come! There will always be concerns regarding the property, but on the whole the achievements of such a small group of dedicated people are huge, I'm so proud of you all.

Some of what keeps me going as a minister is the huge need for people outside the church to know what great time they are missing! That's the good news we need to share, Christ's love needs to be made know within the community surrounding us, and you are the best advert the church has got!

Rev Paul Hardingham continues his series on the ways in which 'God is able...'

...... TO USE US TO MEET OTHERS' NEEDS

We are all familiar with the story of the Feeding of the 5000 (Matthew 14:13-21). It reminds us that God is able to use us in meeting the needs of others. As Jesus says to the disciples: 'you give them something to eat' (16).

We need to share God's compassion: Jesus responded to need, by showing 'compassion' (lit: gut reaction, v14) on the crowds. This isn't simply feeling sorry for others, but being ready to act on their behalf. It's being prepared to enter into their experience and see them as God sees them. You cannot demonstrate compassion at a distance!

We need to share God's heart: It is said that 'The buck stops here'! God wants us to take responsibility for those in need. The disciples tried to pass the buck, telling Jesus to 'send the crowds away' (15). Are we looking for God-given opportunities in church, work or our communities to demonstrate God's love to those who cross our path? It will be costly, involving our time, energy and money eg listening to a colleague, shopping for a neighbour or visiting a friend in hospital.

We need to share what we have: This story reminds us of the challenges of meeting peoples' needs! The disciples only had five loaves and two fish to feed 5000+ people! It is not simply a matter of what we have, but what God can do with it. They offered what they had to Jesus and He multiplied it to feed the people, leaving 12 basketfuls of leftovers. Are we prepared to let God use what we have: our words, prayer and acts of love?

'Helping one person might not change the world, but it could change the world for that one person.'

When did you start praying for the children of your friends? Justin Welby, the Archbishop of Canterbury, thanks God that someone prayed for him before he was even born - in the hope that he would

one day become a Christian.

The Archbishop told the story during a recent short film on the Thy Kingdom Come initiative. He said that after he had become a Christian, he had 'learned that there was a particular person who prayed for me every week - since I was conceived - that I might become a disciple of Christ.'



He concluded: 'I cannot tell you how grateful I am to them.'

REMEMBERING MARY MAGDALENE

news is not new. Perhaps one old example is the assertion that Mary Magdalene was a prostitute. Back in the 6th Century, Pope Gregory is said to have confused her with two other women in the Bible. Medieval Bible scholars also attempted to name an unidentified sinful woman who had washed and anointed the feet of Jesus. As Mary Magdalene is mentioned in the next chapter they regarded her as the same person! After this, many classical artists painted Mary in various states of undress, perpetuating a falsehood.

So what do we really know about Mary? The Gospels tell us that she came from Magdala, a town in Galilee, and Jesus healed her by casting out seven evil spirits. After this she followed Jesus, with other women, on His ministry providing resources. Later, Mary watched Jesus die on the cross, and having cared for His needs while He was alive, wanted to care for Him after His death.

It was when Mary went to anoint the body of Jesus at the tomb that the risen Jesus appeared to her. He told Mary to go to His disciples and tell them about His return to Heaven She was obedient and became the first emissary of the resurrection. In those days, the witness of a woman was worthless. Despite ridicule, Mary had the courage to speak about Jesus in a place of great disbelief. We have to ask ourselves if we have the same courage as Mary. How prepared are we to stand our ground to share Jesus with others in the face of those who mock and scoff at us?

Although we usually associate Mary with the Easter story, this month on 22nd July, the Church celebrates her Feast Day. In this snapshot of Mary's life we know she had experienced great distress and suffering. After Jesus healed her, Mary expressed her gratitude by being utterly committed and devoted to Him.

Jesus can give everyone a new start; a new purpose and direction in life. Like Mary we can thank Him for blessing us, loving us and forgiving us and moving into practical forms of service. Only Jesus can transform our lives so that we can glorify God in all that we do.
