GOD KEEPS PROMISES!

'For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.' (Isaiah 9 verse 6)

Approaching Christmas we are very aware of the political and economic uncertainties that face us. The prophet Isaiah also lived in such uncertain times, as the Assyrians had just conquered the northern kingdom of Israel (734-732 BC). This fulfilled Isaiah's warnings to the people, who had turned their back on God and His ways. However, Isaiah is able to bring a word of hope, promising a Messiah who would come like a great light: 'The people walking in darkness have seen a great light' (Isaiah 9 verse 2). These words are fulfilled in the birth of Jesus 700 years later and describe the person of Jesus:

Wonderful Counsellor: He will give us the wisdom we need, especially when we have difficult decisions to make at work or home, or in dealing with our finances or future direction.

Mighty God: He will provide the help and strength to face a difficult diagnosis, family crisis or relationships breakdown, as we trust His plan and purpose for our lives.

Everlasting Father: He cares for us as a father cares for his children, so that we can come to Him when we feel alone or we are really struggling, knowing that He hears and will answer our prayers.

Prince of Peace: He has secured peace by His cross and resurrection, and so we can find in Him true acceptance, forgiveness and peace for our lives, relationships and future. Christmas is the time to celebrate a God who is faithful to all His promises, 'the zeal of the Lord Almighty will accomplish this' (v 7)

would have been smelly, dirty, and full of mess. So why did God not provide something better for His beloved Son? Why let Joseph and Mary scrounge around until they ended up in a smelly stable? Perhaps because the King of Kings being born in a foul stable is a perfect picture of redemption. Jesus came from glory into a world filled with the dirt, filth and darkness of sin. And Jesus was not put off by darkness in the least – instead, He came to be the Light of the World. Thank God for His unspeakable gift. No wonder the angels sang "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men." (Luke 2 verse14)

WHY WAS THE WORLD READY FOR CHRISTMAS?



Ever wonder why Jesus was born when He was? The Bible tells us that "when the time had fully come, God

sent forth His Son..." The Jewish people had been waiting for their Messiah for centuries. Why did God send Him precisely when He did?

Many biblical scholars believe that the 'time had fully come' for Jesus because of the politics of the time. The Roman Empire's sheer size and dominance had achieved something unique in world history: the opportunity for travel from Bethlehem to Berwick on Tweed without ever crossing into 'enemy territory' or needing a 'passport'. For the first time ever, it was possible for 'common' people to travel wide and far, and quickly spread news and ideas. And all you needed were two languages - Greek to the east of Rome, and Latin to the west and north. You could set sail from Joppa (Tel Aviv) and head for any port on the Med. And the Roman roads ran straight and true throughout the empire.

THINKING ABOUT THE BEATITUDES

Rev Paul Hardingham continues his series.

8. 'Blessed are the persecuted'

'Blessed are those who are persecuted because of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.' (Matthew 5 verse 10).

Somebody once described a Christian as one who is 'completely fearless, continually cheerful and constantly in trouble.' Living the life that Jesus presents in the Beatitudes will not necessarily make us universally popular. We must be prepared for opposition, insults and ridicule or even worse. Of course, persecution is the daily experience for Christians in many parts of our world today.

Jesus didn't tell us to seek persecution, but He did say that when it comes, we should regard it as a blessing:

Firstly, because we are identifying with Jesus: If we identify as fully as we can with Jesus, then we will experience suffering like Him. It is 'because of me' (verse 11) we are opposed or criticized.

Secondly, it shows our faith is genuine: To suffer for our faith is typical of God's people, 'for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you' (verse 12).

Thirdly, because of our reward in heaven: we will not lose out in the future, as Jesus reminds us that 'great is your reward in heaven' (verse 12).

To what extent do we suffer for being a Christian at work, with our friends or family? Although we don't seek it, Jesus describes suffering as authentic Christian experience. We might like to ask these questions as we reflect on this:

• How many people with whom we have contact know that we are a Christian?

- How far are we helping to give them a true picture of what Christianity is about?
- How far do we demonstrate the presence of Jesus in our daily lives?
- If we were arrested for being a Christian, would there be enough evidence to convict us?



PRAY FOR THE PERSECUTED CHRISTIANS IN PAKISTAN

UK-based Release International has made Pakistan its focus for prayer this year, and continues to be deeply concerned for Christians in that country.

As a spokesman for Release International explains, "Most Christians in Pakistan are poor, illiterate and vulnerable to abuse, especially young women and girls. Believers face discrimination in education, employment and the law. Pakistan's blasphemy laws have been used to make false allegations against Christians, often to settle personal vendettas."

Release has helped Christians who have been falsely accused of blasphemy and given support to families of prisoners like Asia Bibi, a mother who spent 10 years in jail on charges that were later thrown out by the Supreme Court.

Speaking recently from Canada, the 54-year old called on Christians everywhere to remember others behind bars.

In a YouTube video, she says: "I, Asia Bibi, believe in Jesus. My belief is strong. I never let my belief weaken." And Asia gave this message to the world: "Stay true to your beliefs. Even if you have to face the sword, please hold firm to your faith; even if you have to sacrifice everything."
